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# Summary of the ISA<sup>2</sup> Legal Act

- Explains the political context which is mostly based in Europe 2020, Digital Agenda for Europe and modernisation of public administrations
- Continues the work done by the predecessor programmes IDA, IDABC, ISA and capitalises on their contributions
- Seeks synergies with and complements to other EU initiatives for the modernisation of the public sector
- Becomes a central reference point for the modernisation of PAs in EU



# Summary of the ISA<sup>2</sup> Legal Act

- Monitors the overall interoperability landscape in Europe and avoid its fragmentation;
- enable, support and promote a holistic approach to the collection, assessment, development, establishment, industrialisation, operation, improvement and maintenance of interoperability solutions in support of cross-border or cross-sector interaction for European public administrations, between themselves and with businesses and citizens;
- promote the reusability, integration and convergence of existing solutions, including those derived from other Union policy areas.



*Measuring of benefits becomes an integral part of the proposed legal act.*

*Under Article 3 describing the activities of the Programme the following legally binding sentence is included:*

"the development of mechanisms that will measure and quantify the benefits of interoperable solutions"

*And again in Article 11:*

"The evaluation of the ISA2 Programme shall contain, where applicable, information regarding:

- (a) quantifiable benefits that the interoperable solutions deliver by linking ICT with users' needs;
- (b) the quantifiable positive impact of the interoperable ICT based solutions.



## The “problem”

How to identify and measure the benefits of interoperability (IoP) in cross-sector or cross-border public services?

## The "approach"

Divide the measurement in at least two levels,

- a) The programme level (macro)
- b) The actions level (micro)

and deal with each of the levels, trying to see if a model could fit both.



- Create a specific action under the current ISA Programme (1<sup>st</sup> half 2014)
- Define the "benefits" we want to measure (2nd half 2014)
- Launch a study that will investigate the state of the art in ICT interoperability cost/benefit models (2nd half 2014)
- Investigate ISA actions (i.e. EULF, Linked OGD, etc.) or other EC initiatives (DG CONNECT SMART 2014/0066 study) that tackle the cost/benefit issues in their scope (2nd half 2014)
- Shape the mechanism for the Programme level measurement (1st half 2015)



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
