

BACKGROUND

The Scenario

Standards-based ICT procurement has been an evolving European Commission (EC) policy area. In particular, as of 2010, it has been prioritized as a way to **contribute to cost-savings in the public sector**. Under the Digital Agenda - Europe's strategy for a flourishing digital economy by 2020 aiming to maximise the benefits of information and communications technology (ICT) for all - **Action 23** commits to providing guidance on the **link between ICT Standardisation and Public Procurement** in order to help authorities use standards to promote **efficiency and reduce lock-in**.

More generally, under Directive 2004/18/EC on public procurement, the technical specifications that shall be set out in the contract documentation, such as contract notices, contract documents or additional documents, must assure **equal access of economic operators to the procurement procedure** and **shall not have the effect of creating unjustified obstacles to the opening up of public procurement to competition**.

In this context the European Commission adopted on the 25th of June 2013 the Communication COM (2013) 455 "**Against lock-in: building open ICT systems by making better use of standards in public procurement**", together with an accompanying working document "**Guide for the procurement of standards-based ICT — Elements of Good Practice**".

As a matter of fact, effects of using ICT open standards are related to:

- **Higher savings when procuring ICT**
- **An increased level of competition among suppliers**
- **Being compliant with EU Public Procurement directives**

Moreover, in the context of the **Sharing and Re-use Framework**, the European Commission also provides guidelines for public administrations wanting to purchase ICT *re-usable solutions* to cut costs and reduce price-related risks while increasing the overall interoperability and sustainability of their ICT solutions.

The Project

Following this Communication, the European Commission issued a series of recommendations as to how to reduce lock-in and is currently trying to raise awareness about the lock-in theme.

To this end, the EC will deploy different dissemination activities over a period of two years, and one of these is the project dedicated to "**Best Practices for ICT procurement based on standards in order to promote efficiency and reduce lock-in**".

Dissemination activities carried out through this project aim to:

- Call on Member States and other European Institutions to use the Guide
- Facilitate the sharing of best practices
- Monitor and report on the outcomes of this process

At the end of this first year of activity many goals have been achieved. Among them it is worth mentioning:

The main goals of the December workshop are:

- Share some good practice examples about ICT procurement;
- Stimulate the debate around the next steps / new ideas for DAE Action 23;
- Present a first set of insights on the state of the art of ICT public procurement using standards through Europe.

In short, if you are involved somehow in ICT procurement and want to know how other organizations similar to yours are successfully dealing with ICT "lock-in", you are warmly invited to attend the “*Open Standards for ICT Procurement: Sharing of Best Practices*” workshop, taking place in Brussels - at DG CONNECT.

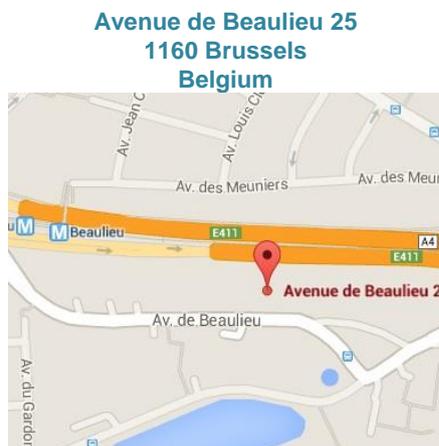
OSS – OPEN SOURCE STRATEGY (EU - WIDE) (15 :35 – 15 :50)
